Foundation, whose mission is to support economic growth and restoration of historic buildings. The Forgivable Loan Program was established with the primary goal to increase occupancy of the city's downtown business district. Secondary goals include the following: address safety issues, improve aesthetics and building facades, and extend the life of existing buildings.

The Forgivable Loan Program launched in May, and to date, three buildings are being renovated as a result. Funding for the program was made possible through the estate of Richard C. Anderson.
