"Macte Virtute"



Macte Virtute is a Latin phrase meaning "increase excellence" and is often used by Youngstown State University (YSU) President and former Ohio State University (OSU) Football Coach James (Jim) P. Tressel. And on Tuesday, October 18, he along with former OSU safety, Mike Doss, will be speaking to the Bryan, Ohio community. Their conversation on *Macte Virtute* will demonstrate to those in attendance how the phrase can translate from the football field to everyday life.

Tressel, a native of Northeast Ohio, graduated from Berea High School in suburban Cleveland in 1971. He earned a bachelor's degree in Education from Baldwin-Wallace College in 1975 and a master's degree in Education from University of Akron in 1977. In 1986 he was named the head football coach of YSU and during his 15 years there, YSU appeared in playoffs ten times and won four national championships. Tressel became the head football coach for OSU in 2001 and in ten seasons won seven Big Ten Championships and the 2002 National Championship. After leaving OSU, Tressel served as executive vice president for student success at the University of Akron and returned to YSU in 2014 as its president. Married to his wife Ellen, a YSU

graduate, they are the proud parents of four adult children, one grandson, and one great-granddaughter.

Born and raised in Canton, Ohio, the Pro Football Hall of Fame city, Doss lived with his mother and grandmother until the age of six when he moved in with his uncle, who became his primary caregiver. After winning back-to-back state football

championships for his alma mater Canton McKinley High School, Doss earned a full-ride scholarship to OSU where he played safety from 1999-2002. During his college career, he became a four-year letterman, three time All American, Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year, Fiesta Bowl MVP, and 2002 National Champion. Upon graduation, Doss was drafted in the National Football League (NFL) by the Indianapolis Colts. He went on to win a Super Bowl with this team alongside Peyton Manning. His NFL career continued for several more years until retiring from the league. Today, Doss works for The Robert Weiler Company, a Columbus based commercial real estate business, while raising his three daughters with his wife.

Both OSU Athletic Hall of Fame inductees, Tressel became a member of the College Football Hall of Fame in 2015 with Doss being inducted into the Hall this December. Together, they will speak about how "leadership is all about the action you take to serve others" and "how can you make a difference for others."

Thomas (Tom) M. Herman was born September 25, 1932, in Edgerton, Ohio, and prior to his retirement and move to South Carolina, was an active member in the Bryan, Ohio community, including the Bryan Area Foundation. A graduate of Miami University of Ohio, Tom married his college sweetheart, Susan (Sue) Young, and they are the proud parents of five boys, Dr. Craig, Dr. Bruce, Steven, Timothy, and Andrew. In 1990, Tom and Sue tragically lost their youngest son, Andrew, better known as "the Gerb," in an automobile accident. Because of their involvement with the Foundation, they established a scholarship in his memory, the Andrew M. Herman Memorial Scholarship Fund. Each year two Bryan High School seniors who have demonstrated leadership abilities and participation in school or community activities, including part-time employment, are eligible to receive one of two \$2,500 scholarships to their college, university, or technical school of choice.

In honor of Tom's 90th birthday on September 25th, the Herman family has pledged to match up to \$15,000 in total donations received now through December 31, 2022. "Wheelz" Rolling into Town

On Tuesday, October 11, Aaron 'Wheelz' Fotheringham will be rolling into town to speak to kindergarten through fifth grade students and teachers from the Bryan City and St. Patrick's elementary schools. Born with Spina Bifida, a birth defect of the spinal cord, Aaron had limited use of his legs and started using a walker, then crutches until the age of eight when he began using his wheelchair full-time. Despite his physical struggles, he was able to find ways to adapt and overcome any obstacle that came his way.

Aaron's first experience at a skatepark was in December 2000 when his father and older brother helped him to the top of a quarter pipe. After some trial and error, eight-year-old Aaron rolled away from his first drop into a ramp and at that moment he was hooked! Where most people see a wheelchair as a limitation, Aaron saw it as freedom!

In 2005, Aaron got the opportunity to enter BMX contests and managed to win a few. Aaron loved the rush of competition, but his desire to have other wheelchair-bound participants to compete against challenged him to progressively try more difficult tricks. Over the years, he achieved the world's first backflip followed by a double backflip, front flip, backflip 180, and backflip 360. All these daring stunts have changed his life and given him the opportunity to appear in magazines, newspapers, sports television, and a feature film. He also gets the chance to travel all over the world speaking to groups and accomplishing his favorite activity, mentoring others with disabilities.

Aaron 'Wheelz' Fotheringham enjoys showing people of all ages that having a disability and using a wheelchair is not a restriction but an opportunity. He is passionate about helping kids see wheelchairs in a new light and usually teaches them a trick or two that they can use for life. We look forward to seeing what tricks he can teach us in October!

Sarah's Friends Receives Grant for Housing Unit

Founded in 1991, Sarah's Friends, is a non-profit in Williams County providing non-judgmental support for those harmed by crime. Operating with the mission to empower victims of domestic violence and abuse to heal emotionally, physically, and spiritually, Sarah's Friends delivers a continuum of care in a manner that promotes individual and family safety, autonomy, and dignity. Serving 175 people each year, they offer compassionate aid, advocacy and referrals, and supportive in-house services.

Sarah's Friends also has four transitional housing units and recently received a \$17,850 grant from the Bryan Area Foundation to renovate unit 114. The newly remodeled apartment will give the individual moving in the opportunity to become economically stable, gainfully employed, and independently sufficient. All survivors and their dependents can be housed for a minimum of six months, with possible extensions up to twenty-four months, until they reach a point of sustainability.





In the next few weeks, a parklet built by Doug Soards, will be appearing in the heart of our downtown area. Parklets are public seating platforms that convert curbside parking spaces into vibrant community spaces. Also known as street seats or curbside seating, most parklets have a distinctive design that creates a public gathering space, with greenery, and/or bike racks. Parklets encourage social engagement, drive economic growth, and enhance city aesthetics. These parklets are being brought to downtown Bryan via the partnership between the BAF Community Impact Committee and the Bryan Development Foundation.

Bryan Inclusive Playground



On Thursday, August 4, news journalist Chase Bachman with television stations WTOL 11 and Fox 36 WUPW came to Bryan to report on the City of Bryan Lincoln Park Inclusive Playground. Being built on the former site of the Lincoln Elementary School, he interviewed Paula Kline, former Bryan City Schools employee; Ben Dominique, City of Bryan Parks and Recreation Department Director; and Amy Miller, President/CEO of the Bryan Area Foundation, about the future addition to our town.





The goal of the project is to build a diverse, safe, and fun play space for people of all abilities that will enhance the quality of life for everyone. To achieve this, inclusive playgrounds are constructed with the Seven Principles of Universal Design and equipment that allow children of all aptitudes to interact with each other and do what they enjoy most.....play! Currently, the closest inclusive playground is located an hour away and not convenient to area residents.

The City of Bryan Parks and Recreation Department will manage the playground and estimate starting construction in September of 2023 with a completion date of April 2024. The project will cost a minimum of \$530,000 with private, not-for-profit, local, and federal funds being raised to pay for it. If enough donations are received, a pavilion and concrete walking paths could also be built on the site.
