Aaron "Wheelz" Fotheringham

"Just try 2 more times!"



The Bryan Area Foundation observed Foundation Week, Sunday, October 16-Saturday, October 22. To help kick-off the celebration, the Foundation had Aaron "Wheelz" Fotheringham roll into town and speak to kindergarten through fifth-grade students and teachers from the Bryan City and St. Patrick's Elementary Schools. A big thanks to The Ability Center and its Executive Director, Stuart James, for helping us to coordinate the day.

Born with Spina Bifida, a birth defect of the spinal cord, Aaron had limited use of his legs and started using a walker, then crutches until the age of eight when he began using his wheelchair full-time. Despite his physical struggles, he was able to find ways to adapt and overcome any obstacle that came his way.



Aaron's first experience at a skatepark was in December 2000 when his father and older brother helped him to the top of a quarter pipe. After some trial and error, eight-yearold Aaron rolled away from his first drop into a ramp and at that moment he was hooked! Where most people see a wheelchair as a limitation, Aaron saw it as freedom!

Now at the age of 31, Aaron competes in Wheelchair Motocross, and tours with Nitro Circus Live. He also travels the world speaking to groups and mentoring others with disabilities. While addressing the students in Bryan, Aaron emphasized the importance of appreciating people of different abilities and encouraged everyone to dream big, no matter what challenges may arise. He told students that it is important to be persistent in achieving one's goals, and when on the verge of giving up, "just try two more times." He said that when you do this, that's when you accomplish your objective.





We are so grateful that Aaron "Wheelz" Fotheringham came to Bryan to help us celebrate Foundation Week 2022. His motivational words and inspiring message are sure to help all of us reach for the stars.

Football Legends Come to Bryan

As the Bryan Area Foundation continued celebrating Foundation Week from Sunday, October 16-Saturday, October 22, our gift to the community was to welcome two football icons to Bryan to speak about leadership. Youngstown State University (YSU) President and former Ohio State University (OSU) Football Coach James (Jim) P. Tressel and former OSU safety and Super Bowl XLI Champion Mike Doss delivered their remarks on Tuesday, October 18 at the Bryan Arts and Education Center. Each talked about the lessons they had learned from the game of football that were transferable to their everyday successes. They also had the chance to reminisce on the twenty year anniversary of The Ohio State University Football team winning the National Championship.

Tressel, who will be retiring from YSU in February of 2023, stated that one of the elements of leadership is servanthood and an eagerness to serve others for the benefit of the whole. When asked by Doss who his most significant mentor was, the audience anticipated Tressel's answer would be his father and former college football coach. Tressel instead indicated it was his mother who demonstrated the importance of serving others, whether it was her family, neighbors, or community.

Doss, a high school, college, and NFL champion from Canton, Ohio, spoke about learning how to transition when events

happen that are out of your control. He recalled his high school and college football playing days and how he had to adapt to new coaches when his previous ones left. Being flexible in this way is especially applicable today with hybrid work environments, changing job and family responsibilities, and financial volatility.

Andrew M. Herman Memorial Scholarship Fund Match Deadline - December 31st


All monies received by Saturday, December 31, in honor of Tom Herman's 90th birthday will be matched by the Herman Family, up to \$15,000 total.



The fourth quarter 2022 PIP meeting was held on Monday, October 24 at the First Presbyterian Church, Bryan. Three worthy organizations were nominated:



First Presbyterian Church Tuesday Night Free Meal Program: The first presentation, First Presbyterian Church Tuesday Night Free Meal Program, was nominated by numerous PIP members and presented by Diana Moore Eschhofen. Started in 2009, the church has been offering free meals on Tuesday nights for anyone in the community with a need. The eight teams of workers serve an average of 68 people each week. The funds for the meals are donated by church members over and above their annual tithes. This PIP grant would help the program continue and to accommodate even more people in need.

Flair on the Square: Nominated by several PIP members and presented by Kathy Smith, Flair on the Square will be a juried fine arts festival around downtown Bryan and is scheduled for Saturday, July 29, 2023. This first-time event will feature live performances, delicious culinary treats, and a local fresh market. The goal of the festival is to cultivate, encourage, and develop public appreciation and support for the visual arts for the enjoyment of northwest Ohio residents. The PIP grant would be used for expenses related to the event that include marketing, entertainment, and staging. They are trying to raise \$50,000 for the project and are currently seeking funding from a variety of sources.

CPC Women's Health Resource: The last presentation was nominated and given by Cheryl Andres. CPC Women's Health Resource empowers individuals to make life-affirming decisions through education, counseling, and compassion care, based on the ministry of Jesus Christ. They provide support and practical assistance to women during and after pregnancy. Their services are free of charge and the PIP grant would be used to help them maintain their program and mission.

And the Winner Is . . . After the votes were tallied, the First Presbyterian Church Tuesday Night Free Meal Program was chosen and will be the beneficiary of a \$6,725 grant.

Looking for a way to give back to our community and support your charitable interests?

1RA Charitable Rollover

Turn your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from your Individual Retirement Account (IRA) into a tax-saving charitable gift through a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD).

In 2015, the IRA QCD became a permanent part of the internal revenue code. People 70 ½ or older are allowed to transfer up to \$100,000 annually (or \$200,000 for a couple) from their IRA accounts directly to a charity, without first having to recognize the distribution as taxable income, potentially saving federal, state, and local income taxes.



The Bryan Area Foundation can help you support your charitable interests

by offering several fund options: a community fund, designated fund, scholarship fund, or a field-of-interest fund. The law prohibits QCD's to a donor advised fund.

Planning today can ensure the causes you care about will continue to be supported beyond your lifetime.

Our New Home

124 South Lynn Street



After 53 years of moving from donated space to leased occupancy, the Bryan Area Foundation will finally own a home in the heart of downtown Bryan. Thanks to the generosity of two Foundation and lifelong community members, the Foundation purchased the former Penrod George Building at 124 South Lynn Street. This new location will provide the Foundation with more space and privacy, a physical mailing address, savings from rental expenses, and a

highly visible spot adjacent to the historic Bryan Courthouse Square. It also reinforces the Foundation's commitment to be a part of the economic growth in downtown Bryan. Together, the Foundation and its current and future neighboring businesses will restore, beautify, and develop the area into a thriving commercial district. This is the hope of the two generous donors, as well as to inspire other members of our community to come forth with funds to help remodel the building's exterior and interior.

Conceptual board renderings have been designed and are available for review. They address separate (non-cubicle) offices, a large conference room, space for hosted events, and room for future growth.
