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## Making a Dream a Reality

For twelve years, Paula Kline worked with children with various disabilities in the Bryan City Schools. In order for them to enjoy outdoor recess, she would take them to Fort Wayne, Indiana, the closest location to Bryan, with an inclusive playground. During one of those drives to Indiana, Paula wondered why her hometown of Bryan

couldn't have its own all-inclusive playground. As a twenty-five-year Bryan Parks and Recreation Board member, she inquired about the possibility. Even though the Bryan Parks and Recreation Department wanted to build such a playground, the timing, budget, and location were never quite right. In 2019, Paula encouraged her Bryan High School Class of 1967 to establish a project fund at the Bryan Area Foundation. By doing this, the fund would be an avenue to collect and save donations until the idea could be brought to fruition. Last year, Benjamin Dominique, Director of Parks and Recreation for the City of Bryan, agreed it was time to move forward with the project.

Fast forward to today, and the fundraising campaign to help build the inclusive playground on the former Lincoln Elementary School site is in full gear. Funding has come from the state, local service groups, corporate partners, individual donors, non-profit grants, and as a beneficiary of the 2023 Blizzard Auction. Sixty-eight percent of the \$731,000 needed to break ground and begin construction this fall has been raised. The grand opening of the playground will be in the spring of 2024.

Allowing children to play is not only fun but also an essential part of their development, as it is critical for the successful growth of their brain and body. An inclusive playground in



Bryan will provide the type of environment where children and families of all physical, mental, and social abilities can learn, play, and grow together. Using the seven principles of universal design and including equipment like ramp entries and a poured-in-place surface, the playground will also feature a zipline, monkey bars, swings, merry-go-round, and tower/slide.

# Grant & Scholarship

#### Wabash Cannonball Trail

The Bryan Area Foundation, Montpelier Area Foundation, and Millcreek-West Unity Area Foundation independently agreed to financially support an engineering study for the Wabash Cannonball Trail. Once the study results are evaluated, the Friends of Montpelier Parks can apply for grants and capital funds to pay for the paving of the trail



from County Road 13 to the Fulton County line, east of West Unity. Improving the Wabash Cannonball Trail would give Williams County a safe and well-maintained outdoor space for walking, biking, and equestrian use. It would also provide an economic benefit for the region.

Realizing the significance of paving the trail, all three Foundations collaboratively gave a total of \$10,000 to the study. Its results should be received in the fall of 2023, so additional funding can be secured. The goal is to complete the paving in the future, enhancing a recreational area for all community members to enjoy.

#### Leaving a Legacy

Linda (Nofziger) Belcher was born in March 1948 and graduated from Stryker High School in 1966. She married her high school sweetheart, Mick Belcher, in 1967. After attending Goshen College, Bowling Green State University, and receiving her master's degree in education from the University of Toledo, the couple settled in West Unity in 1972. Mick started his career as a health and physical education teacher at Hilltop High School before becoming its high school principal for eighteen years. Linda taught art, music, kindergarten (transition), first grade, and reading in the Bryan City School District.

Since Linda deeply valued education and encouraged everyone to obtain a post-secondary degree, she and her husband guided and supported their three children, Erik, Kristin, and Brooke, in receiving

their doctorate degrees. She also cheered them on as they competed in high school and college sporting events. But Linda's children were not the only ones to benefit from her kind words of reassurance and inspiration. Many of her students received rides home, delicious treats, and typed science fair project papers. Her beautiful smile, kind heart, and giving nature were for everyone to enjoy.

Linda unexpectedly passed away in November of 2022, and since the Belcher Family Scholarship Fund had been established in 2019, all memorial gifts were designated for it. The outpouring of donations and support it received from family, friends, former students and co-workers was overwhelming. Seventy donors gave more than \$8,000 in Linda's honor, demonstrating how many lives she helped and inspired. Contributions are still being received, and the legacy that Linda started will continue to touch the lives of future generations forever.

#### Celebrating 8 years!

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Since 2016, more than \$179,800 has been donated to 31 nonprofits throughout Williams County!

The first quarter 2023 PIP meeting was held on Monday, January 30, at the First Presbyterian Church, Bryan. PIP currently has 92 members. Jeanette Roberts was recognized as the new PIP Program Director and Jody Freeman as the new Member-at-large. Three worthy contributions were nominated:

<u>Cancer Assistance of Williams County</u>: Nominated and presented by Cheryl Andres, Cancer Assistance of Williams County has served the county since 1996. They have two main fundraisers each year, Bike to the Bridge and Witches & Warlocks. They also receive tremendous support from several county school sports, FFA programs, and memorial donations that help with their operations. Last year they assisted those diagnosed with cancer with \$1,500 towards expenses related to their diagnosis. PIP's grant would be used to purchase grocery gift cards.

Bryan Development Foundation (BDF)/Christkindl Market: The second presentation, Bryan Development Foundation/ Christkindl Market, was nominated by Amy Miller and Ann Spangler and presented by Ann Spangler. Ann highlighted that the 2022 event had excellent attendance, with happy vendors, and numerous community involvement. She said they are already planning for this year, and their wish list would be to build another booth to sell hot beverages. She estimates this cost to be \$8,000, and the PIP money would help with this expense.

<u>Sanctuary Homeless Shelter</u>: The last presentation was nominated by Cheryl Andres and Margie Geisler and presented by Cheryl Andres. The Sanctuary Homeless Shelter was established in 1993 to provide clients with clothing, food, and shelter. In 2005, they purchased the building on Main Street. They have four apartments and serve 80-90 people a year. PIP's donation would be used for operating expenses.
