## City of Bryan Parks & Recreation



The Bryan Area Foundation awarded a \$35,000 grant to the City of Bryan Parks and Recreation Department to help pay for a pedestrian pathway in East End Park. To be completed by early fall, the new .3-mile loop in and around East End Park will provide Bryan residents with another walking, jogging, and biking pathway for leisure and exercise. It will be eight feet wide and made of concrete, allowing non-motorized pedestrians the ability to use the pathway, weather permitting, all year round.

With the anticipated additional need for these items and increased costs, the Bryan Area Foundation awarded the First Lutheran Church of Stryker a \$2,000 Founder's grant. It will help the students return to school in the fall with the necessary supplies and be able to focus on their learning.

## Kate's Kart, Inc.



The Bryan Area Foundation awarded a \$2,500 Founder's grant to Kate's Kart, Inc., a pediatric book gifting program at Parkview Bryan Hospital. Started in 2008 by the Layman Family in loving memory of their daughter, Kate, who was born with a congenital heart defect and spent much of her life in the hospital, enduring multiple medical procedures before passing away at the tender age of 18 months. After her death, Kate's family was inspired to do something to encourage others who spent time in the hospital. They started giving away new books to children at their local hospital in honor of Kate and her love of books. This effort has flourished into Kate's Kart, Inc., a nonprofit organization serving 25 Northeast Indiana and Northwest Ohio

hospitals. Through the generous support of the community, a team of over 100 volunteers and hospital staff gives more than 4,000 new books every month to scared and hurt children and their families. The Bryan Area Foundation's grant will help purchase more books and continue the program here at Parkview Bryan Hospital.

## Sauder Village

The Bryan Area Foundation awarded Sauder Village a \$20,000 grant for technology in the new Carolyn Sauder Education Center, which has three flexible classrooms, offices, and preparation space. The

money will help pay for Smart Boards, OWLS cameras, and audio equipment that will greatly expand their educational offerings beyond the Historic Village season, providing more accessibility to additional schools, youth groups, and adults in person and virtually year-round. The official grand opening of the Carolyn Sauder Education Center will be on Tuesday, June 10.

## Lily Creek Farms



Lily Creek Farms was awarded a \$30,000 grant from the Bryan Area Foundation for capital improvements to their therapeutic riding center. The funds will be used to upgrade bathrooms for ADA compliance, purchase a sawdust wagon, and improve lighting and electrical configurations, providing greater accessibility, operational efficiency, and support to their vocational program. Currently, 40% of Lily Creek Farms's clients are from Williams County.

## Montpelier Exempted Village Schools

Congratulations to the Montpelier Exempted Village Schools for receiving a \$4,000 grant from the Montpelier Area Foundation to support the Skilled Trades program. Established in 2018, this course assists students entering the skilled trade profession with scholarships to secondary schools, a small starter tool kit, recognition of outstanding scholars with year-end awards, and purchasing tools and equipment needed for the program's classroom.



This year's \$4,000 grant will provide three gold and two silver scholarships enabling students going into the workforce to receive an 8-piece or 6-piece drill set and a bag with tools. ## Montpelier Public Library

# Scholarships



# Women's Giving Circle



The 2nd quarter meeting was held Monday, April 28, with 29 members attending, including 4 ladies who joined and one guest. PIP member and 2024 fourth quarter \$6,775 recipient Diane Ullom, Executive Director of Compassion Medical Clinic of Williams County, thanked the membership for their recent grant, which has been used to purchase prescription drugs and help pay for lab work. Next, new PIP member and Special Olympics of Williams County Local Coordinator, Angela Luke, spoke on how the nonprofit used the first quarter's \$5,525 PIP monies to help them attend their latest competition in Columbus and cover the transportation, hotel, and other expenses related to the trip.

Three local organizations were nominated during the meeting:

**Mentors For Williams County:** Michelle Henricks nominated the nonprofit, and new PIP member Ashley Epling talked about the organization, founded in 2020. Mentors For Williams County's goal is to promote the growth and development of young people, which will reassert a sense of hope in their future. PIP monies would help them recruit, train, and retain mentors for local youth who would benefit from a positive role model. The nonprofit will also use part of the money for operational needs, which include a software database, a Rediscovering You workbook, and other supplies that help to build relationships between the adults and youth.

**4-H Camp Palmer:** Nominated and presented by Donna Missler, the 4-H camp serves K-18 youth in 11 counties, with 150 campers from Williams County last year. The camp needs a playground, active high ropes and ziplining equipment, quiet zones, STEM needs, and rock tumblers. A PIP grant would be used to purchase these items for future campers and their activities.

**Williams County Community Gardening Association (WCCGA):** The last presentation, WCCGA, was nominated by Jeanette Roberts and given by Laura Higgins. The nonprofit needs assistance to maintain the gardens in Bryan's 20 beds and Edon's 9 beds, which include watering and mowing. The cost for maintenance of the garden beds is over \$100/bed. The charge for the gardeners is \$20 per year, and unpaid volunteers run the 501(c)3. PIP monies would help with the maintenance of all the gardens.
