The BHS class of 2025 exemplified the above quote by Coretta Scott King when it stepped forward offering its remaining class assets to establish a scholarship for fellow BHS graduates. Class officers Katherine Thormeier and Dominique Malanga met with Amy Miller (BAF Pres/CEO) in the Spring of 2025 to discuss ideas for establishing a scholarship using their remaining class funds. Their class, having been 8th graders during the Covid19 pandemic, had \$11,000 remaining due to their 8th grade class trip to Chicago having been cancelled. Rather than installing a bench, or buying flags, or something similar, the pair reached out to inquire about creating a scholarship fund. After discussing multiple avenues/types of scholarships and receiving the approval by Bryan City School officials, the Welcome Home Scholarship was born.

The Welcome Home Scholarship serves to encourage fellow BHS graduates that have gone on to further their education outside Williams County, to consider returning to Williams County to live, work, serve, and play upon graduating from an accredited college, university, or trade school. Recipients of the Welcome Home scholarship will receive up to \$10,000 for repayment of federal student loan debt in quarterly installments for one year following their return to Williams County.

Welcome Home Scholarship Eligibility:

- Applicants must be Bryan High School (BHS) graduates that have gone on to also graduate (or be graduating from) an accredited college, university, or trade school within the last seven years.
- Applicants may not be living and working in Williams County at the time they apply but must be committed to returning to Williams County within twelve months of the award decision being made.
- Applicants must be working for a Williams County Employer in a full-time position for 90 days before the first award disbursement will be made.
 - Preference will be given to applicants that have intention to get involved in philanthropic service in Williams County through service clubs or volunteerism.
 - Applicants must have federal student loan debt to qualify.

Applications for the first Welcome Home Scholarship will be available on the Bryan Area Foundation website in October 2025, with the first recipient being awarded at the BHS Homecoming football game in the Fall of 2026. 








Proceeds from all Festival of Trees Activities benefit the funds of BAF and the people of Williams County.



In Fiscal Year 2025, the Bryan Area Foundation adopted "Planting Trees" as its theme, symbolizing endowment growth for future generations. Two key initiatives brought this vision to life:

- Matching Fund Program: The foundation allocated \$50,000 to match 25% of gifts to community funds. Donor response exceeded expectations, exhausting the matching funds by December and generating over \$200,000 in donations while opening 10 new funds.
- Festival of Trees: The inaugural festival on Bryan's historic square combined community celebration with fundraising through a merchant decorating contest, progressive holiday party, commemorative ornament sales, and silent auction of fund-themed Christmas trees. The event successfully educated the community about foundation funds while strengthening holiday traditions.

These initiatives created immediate community engagement and long-term resources for Williams

The Bryan Area Foundation awarded a \$25,000 matching grant to the Village of Edgerton to help with the construction of a new community center at Miller Park. The proposed project, a 7,800 square-foot space, will include a warming kitchen, ADA-compliant restrooms, an exterior deck and patio overlooking the pond, energy-efficient lighting, and underground utilities. Additionally, ADA-compliant pedestrian sidewalks and an entryway will be installed to ensure accessibility for all members of the community, county, and region. The newly formed Edgerton Development Foundation matched the funds with its own \$25,000.


Village of West Unity

Robert F. Flightner Memorial Law Enforcement Scholarship

Congratulations to the City of Bryan, Ohio, Police Department, Detective Justin Coffman, and Captain Jamie Mendez on receiving the Robert F. Flightner Memorial Law Enforcement Scholarship. This annual scholarship assists the training and education of law enforcement officers in Williams County.

Detective Coffman, who was awarded a \$500 scholarship, will use the funds to attend a Cyber Crime First Responder course designed to help officers more effectively investigate crimes involving various types of digital evidence. By completing this training in the upcoming months, Detective Coffman will be qualified to teach the Digital Evidence class at the Police Academy. It will also contribute to his required hours for the State of Ohio's Master Criminal Investigator Certification.

Captain Mendez received a \$1,000 scholarship and will use the money to attend

the State of Ohio Basic Academy Driving Instructor course. After completing this program,

he will use his knowledge to teach the Driving Unit in the Peace Officer Basic Training curriculum. He will also instruct students in this class at the Northwest Community College Police Academy and help with the Bryan Police Department and other agencies with updated techniques.

After graduation, Matthew hopes to move to a leadership position where he can positively influence district policies, instructional methodologies, and program development.

Coleen Smith, Bryan City Schools, Seventh and Eighth Grade Intervention Teacher, was awarded the 2025 Benedict Family Outstanding Educator Award at the Academic Booster Club (ABC) Awards breakfast. Nominated by coworkers, students, and Bryan community members, Coleen's job requires her to work with pupils who have varied learning styles and might struggle in a typical school setting. She tackles this challenge with patience and understanding, helping them become the best they can be. And because of her efforts in building trust and confidence with these young adults, many of them have stayed on the path to graduation.

An example of her dedication was when the Bryan City Schools enrolled several Spanish-speaking students. Coleen researched and learned new methods and the language to meet their needs. As one nominator stated, "Working with Coleen has made me a better teacher. I learn from her every day through her interactions with students and strive to emulate her patience and strategies when working with them. Bryan City Schools is fortunate to have her, and she is very deserving of this award."
