



Bryan Area Foundation Awards Historic \$750,000 Grant

The Foundation is proud to announce the largest single grant in the Foundation's history to support the restoration and renovation of the historic Arts & Education (A&E) building in downtown Bryan, Ohio.

The "ART Connects Us" campaign is working to raise more than \$6 million to transform this beloved but aging facility into a modern, accessible, and inspiring community landmark. The Foundation's grant represents a significant milestone in that effort and reflects our deep belief in the power of arts and education to strengthen the fabric of our community.



The ART Connects Us Project Fund was established by Bryan City Schools in November 2024 at the Bryan Area Foundation, and since that time, a committed group of local professionals has been at work on the project scope, architectural design, and fundraising to bring the project to fruition.

Built in 1903 and last updated in 1989, the A&E building has served generations of Williams County residents — but the building's age has become problematic. Bryan native and arts advocate Russ Davies, who is leading the ART Connects Us capital campaign, notes that "a strong arts culture — and the facilities to support it — creates shared experiences with lasting social and generational impact. The A&E's infrastructure has fallen behind modern standards, demand for quality programming has outpaced what the space can offer, and accessibility barriers limit participation for those with mobility needs. Simply put, the facility can no longer provide the inspiring experience our community deserves."

The A&E renovation will address these challenges head-on. Improvements include a fully accessible entrance and expanded lobby, additional restrooms, a new ticket counter and information desk, a community lounge and gallery space, upgraded dressing rooms and a green room, a new scene shop, modernized sound and lighting systems, new seating throughout the auditorium, and expanded parking. The result will be a reimagined cultural hub capable of attracting top-tier entertainment and providing educational experiences.

The investment goes beyond bricks and mortar. Research consistently shows that access to the arts improves academic achievement, supports social and emotional development, and prepares young people with the creativity, communication, and collaboration skills that today's employers need most. A revitalized Arts & Education Center will serve students from across the region while also providing a vibrant gathering place where the broader community can connect through shared experiences.

The Bryan Area Foundation is honored to collaborate with the community to make this vision a reality. Together, we can ensure a thriving cultural legacy for generations to come. Return to Your Roots has also taken shape closer to home — literally. This year, we completed our **Timeline Wall** here in our office on the square in downtown Bryan. Spanning from the Foundation's inception in 1969 through our move to this new home in 2023, the wall became an unexpected gift to all of us. The process of building it was an exercise in gratitude — recognizing with pride the many people, gifts, and moments that have shaped this organization over more than five decades.

There are many chapters yet to be written. It is an honor to be part of this Foundation's infinite timeline, and to serve a community so willing to invest in its own story.

Black Swamp Area Council of Scouting America

The Black Swamp Area Council of Scouting America received a \$5,000 grant from the Bryan Area Foundation to help pay for phase two of the construction of Cooper Lodge at Camp Lakota in Defiance, Ohio. Bryan City Band

The Bryan Area Foundation awarded the Bryan City Band a \$2,500 grant for commissioned music to help celebrate the band's 175th anniversary. Established in 1852, the band has been providing musical entertainment to the City of Bryan, Ohio, and is one of the oldest, continuously performing bands in the United States. They play weekly during the summer, and a small ensemble of members plays at special events in Bryan and surrounding communities.

To help commemorate the anniversary, a composer was commissioned to create a unique piece of music for the musicians to perform in the summer of 2026. This composition will give the band members, who range from high schoolers to 80-year-olds, the opportunity to play a piece created especially for them, while providing the audience a "world premiere new music experience".

Building Youth Programs

Gotshall Family Excellence Award

In the 1990's, staff members of Bryan City Schools, along with community members, created the Gotshall Excellence Award, a \$1,000 award, used to incentivize students to complete a rigorous college prep curriculum over their four years in high school. The award was originally financed by the Bryan City School's educational foundation fund

and named after JoNell Gotshall, as recognition for her outstanding service to Bryan City Schools as a long-time teacher. The program was successful, and by 2004, both advanced science and senior level math classes had

increased enrollments, and 75% of previous Excellence Award winners had been music class participants in addition to their standard courses. Regrettably though, when the original funding source was depleted, the Excellence Award was discontinued.

In 2024, the Gotshall Family Excellence Award returned, and qualifying Bryan High School graduating seniors were recognized at the May Academic Booster Club Awards night. Made possible by the generosity of JoNell Gotshall, through the establishment of the Gotshall Family Donor Advised Fund, held at the Bryan Area Foundation, and a partnership with the Academic Booster Club, the award will be \$2,000 to each student who meets the criteria.

- 4 credits of English
- 4 credits of Math
- 4 credits of Science
- 4 credits of Social Studies
- 3 credits of Foreign Language
- 1 credit of Fine Art
- An overall GPA of 3.5 or higher
- A composite ACT score of 27 or higher

Women's Giving Circle

On Thursday, January 29, PIP held its first meeting of 2026 at its new meeting location, Zazarac's Bar & Eatery. Everyone in attendance had the chance to socialize with food and beverages and learn about local nonprofits doing impactful work in our community. Three 2025 grant winners spoke during the evening.

PIP recipient Amber Gebers introduced stylist Morgan Jones, representing **Beauty for All Ages**, who received the third-quarter \$6,275 grant. This money has been used to provide free, professional hair services to residents with limited resources staying in partnered assisted living and nursing facilities. Established in 2024, the program removes financial barriers and gives essential grooming services while uplifting the spirits, confidence, and dignity of those served. Krystal Hake, **Edon LifeWise**, thanked PIP for the fourth-quarter \$6,275 grant that was used to purchase LifeWise Bibles, t-shirts, tables, and chairs for their classrooms. Some of the funds will be used to upgrade their shuttle bus to transport the students from the school to their facility. Pheba Sam, **Sanctuary Homeless Shelter**, who received the fourth-quarter second chance grant of \$2,500, stated the money was used to rent two additional apartments, giving shelter to even more clients.

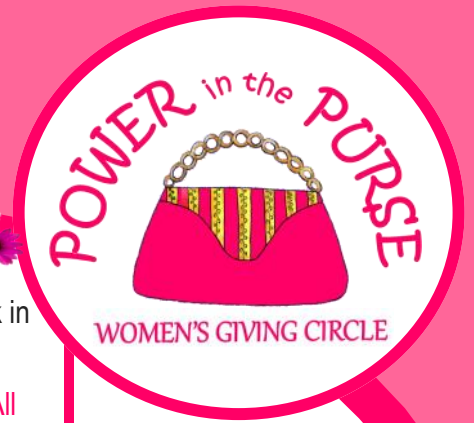
The three nonprofits that were picked and presented are as follows:

Lily Creek Farms: Nominated by Cheryl Andres and presented by Jami Young, Lily Creek Farms' mission is to help individuals heal mind, body, and spirit through equine-assisted and farm-related activities. Funded by donations and grants from organizations and individuals, Williams County has 40% participation in Lily Creek Farms programs. There is a \$40 charge, but the actual cost is \$200. The PIP grant would help cover the difference and pay additional elements that support Lily Creek Farms and its various therapies.

Williams County Humane Society: Nominated and presented by Alicia Strup of the Williams County Humane Society, which exists to reduce animal suffering in Williams County, Ohio, and to improve outcomes for companion animals through direct intervention, education, and community services. The nonprofit is assisting with the overpopulation of free-roaming cats in Williams County through its trap-neuter-release program. They also have an Angel to Animals fund that covers veterinary visits for dogs or cats living at the shelter. PIP monies would help with both these initiatives.

Bread of Life Community Center: Nominated by Deb Beevers and presented by Emily Ebaugh, Bread of Life Community Center is housed in the former First Lutheran Church. The nonprofit is committed to improving the physical, mental, and spiritual well-being of those living in the northeast neighborhood and the surrounding areas of Bryan, Ohio, through educational programs, feeding ministries, and community activities. Started by Pastor Richard Franks and his wife, PIP member Betty Franks, Bread of Life Community Center has seen a dramatic increase in the need for its services. PIP monies would be used to expand their programming to reach more families and children.

And the Winner Is.....After the votes were tallied, the **Bread of Life Community Center** was chosen and is the beneficiary of a **\$5,550 grant!**

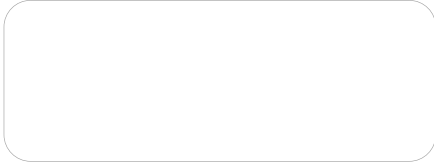

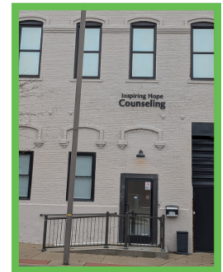

The Community Impact Project Fund Building for the future!

In 2021, Bryan Area Foundation (BAF) members established the Community Impact Committee (CIC) to evaluate and address the decline in the number and quality of buildings and businesses within Bryan's downtown. At the root of the issue, the cost of restoring and renovating historic buildings was cost prohibitive for would-be entrepreneurs and investors. To address the need, the BAF trustees allocated \$150,000 from the retained earnings of the General Community Fund as seed money to create the Community Impact Project Fund. An estate gift, along with the generosity of many donors have further supplemented the funding.



At the present, over one million dollars have been invested in restoring historical buildings on or near the Williams County Courthouse Square. Additionally, the Foundation has invested in developing the "Live the Sweet Life" brand, website, and social media assets to market Bryan as a great place to visit and an even greater place to live. It also provided the seed funding to establish the holiday Christkindl Market of Bryan event.



In 2025, the Bryan Area Foundation CIC is focused on further investment in historic downtown buildings and generating additional economic development opportunities for all.



To showcase some of the projects completed thus far, the Bryan Area Foundation has created a series of "Building for the Future" videos. The videos feature buildings enhanced by the Forgivable Loan Program, financed by the Bryan Area Foundation and executed by community partner Bryan Development.

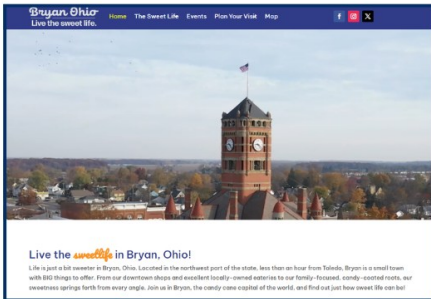

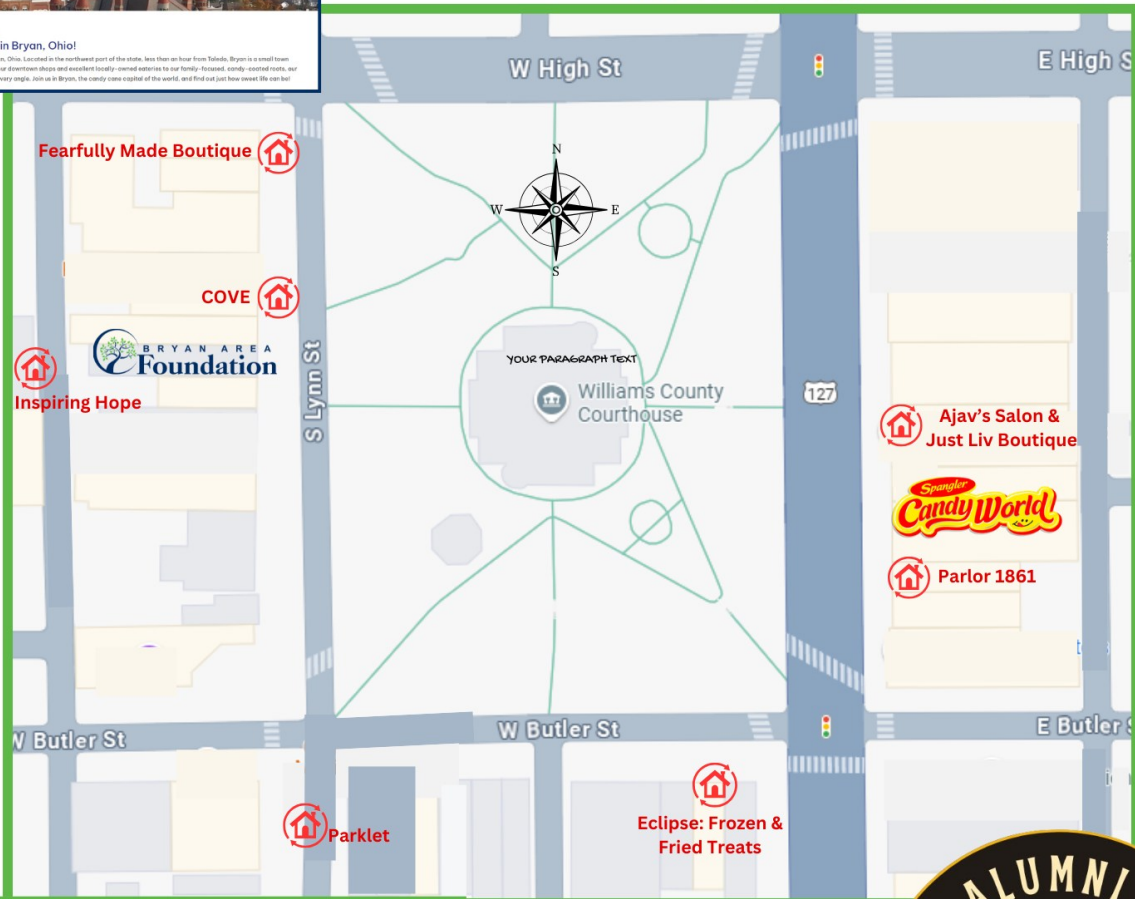
